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1. INTRODUCTION

This document is a living, working road map to guide the Forest in providing a quality, sustainable recreation sites program. It describes the vision for the overall Forest recreation program and outlines proposals specific to individual developed recreation sites.

The proposals and guidance contained in this document were developed through, and are the end result of, the national Recreation Facility Analysis (RFA) process. Existing and projected visitor demands, recreation program niche, resource conditions, links to the community, program costs, and revenue were all considered in developing proposals.

This document will serve as a framework from which the Forest will prioritize investments, and pursue changes in operations or maintenance of recreation sites. Proposals are wholly consistent with the Pacific Southwest Region's "Recreation Strategy", and the San Bernardino Forest Land and Resource Management Plan.

The Forest recognizes that site-specific analysis and public involvement may be necessary prior to implementing some of the proposals contained in this document. As implementation of site-specific proposals are considered, they will be evaluated to determine if they are subject to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and all required procedures shall be executed.

The Forest also recognizes that proposals relating to fees will require consistency with criteria outlined in the Recreation Enhancement Act (REA) and coordination with the appropriate Recreation Resource Advisory Committee (RRAC).

2. SUMMARY - Programmatic Effects Of Implementation

A. BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF PROCESS

The purpose of the Recreation Facility Analysis process is to display the tasks needed over the next 5 years to bring the Forest's recreation infrastructure into alignment with the resources available to operate and maintain it to standard. Many of our facilities were built 30-50 years ago and have reached the end of their useful life without significant deferred maintenance investment. Other facilities receive no or little use, and no longer serve the demand that existed 30-50 years ago. The fundamental premise of the program of work is to create an inventory which is sufficiently sustainable and flexible to be adapted annually to any changes in available resources. The program of work has been developed to meet the following objectives:

- Operate and maintain sites to standard within available revenue stream.
- Reduce deferred maintenance by 20% over the 5 year life of the program of work.
- Focus available resources on sites which conform most closely to the Forest Recreation Program Niche.
- Maintain and enhance customer satisfaction with available sites.

The RFA process defines the proposed actions for management of forest recreation sites in order to meet the desired future condition that aligns with the Forest Plan. For purposes of the analysis and planning for future proposed actions, four categories (A-D) of proposed management are used. These categories are:

- 1) <u>Category A:</u> sites that are under some type of operational or contractual agreement whose terms are longer than the 5-year period of the RFA.
- 2) <u>Category B:</u> sites that meet the unit niche; are environmentally sustainable within the capability and capacity of the natural resources; are supported by and provide support to local communities; and have a sustainable management cost-benefit ratio.
- 3) <u>Category C:</u> sites that do not meet all of the above criteria, but with a combination of mitigation, additional resources, or other type of action could be made to qualify for Category B status.
- 4) <u>Category D:</u> sites that do not meet all of the (Category B) criteria; or fall sufficiently short in one or more of the criterion so as to render the capability of meeting it unsustainable. These sites may be managed for dispersed recreation opportunities.

Sites were evaluated and ranked based on conformance to the forest niche and amount of recreation use (35%), financial efficiency (35%), and environmental and community sustainability (30%).

Some sites were identified as non-discretionary based primarily on existing agreements such as concession permits.

SAN BERNARDINO NATIONAL FOREST NICHE:

Easy access, natural settings, day and week-end recreation, conservation education for a multitude of diverse visitors, (many novice outdoor recreationists), and dramatic scenery define the San Bernardino National Forest; it is a mountain refuge surrounded by a rapidly growing, diverse urban fabric. From the edge of active metropolitan areas to rugged deserts, scenic canyons and backcountry wildlands of chaparral which rise to towering peaks, dense forests and cool lakes, the Forest offers varied natural recreation opportunities that are integrated with natural resource stewardship.

The San Bernardino National Forest has green-cloaked mountains with deeply incised canyons and swift-flowing streams; steeply rising peaks that create a strong visual and physical edge to the urban development of the Inland Empire. Twisting, climbing roads along big tree forested landscapes on the mountain sides, quickly separate the alpine communities from the valley cities seen below; a contrast to the megalopolis in spirit, character and climate. These natural settings provide the recreation opportunity for a diverse visitor population including extended families or individual solitude.

Within mountain and canyon settings are islands of relatively flat land where development of communities, resorts and recreation areas that utilize the character and features of the Forest for daily life as well as recreation and amenities occurs. The resort communities of Lake Arrowhead, Big Bear and Idyllwild within the Forest are familiar names to the 24 million people living in southern California, 80% of who are 90 minutes or less from forests. These mountain communities form the magnet and the surrounding Forest lands become opportunities to those who visit the area.

The character of the mountain resorts, architecture, clear air, recreation opportunities (including hiking, snow related activities and general relaxation) within the dense forests are a contrast to the cities below; the human spirit may reflect and renew. The proximity to the Forest from the major urban areas of Los Angeles and Orange County to Palm Springs, Coachella Valley, High Deserts, San Diego and the Inland Empire Cities allow quick access to the alpine setting within hours. An obvious change in attitude occurs whether the individual is driving through the Forest on the Rim of the World and Palms to Pines Scenic Byways for a few hours or camping in the Forest for a weekend.

Outdoor recreation opportunities are varied and abundant. The San Bernardino National Forest is regionally renowned for outstanding winter sports opportunities, including three major ski areas. Special uses, including skiing, snow boarding, organization camps, recreation residences, shooting areas and ranges, snow play and even an arboretum reflect the urban influences upon the Forest. There are many diverse recreation opportunities from small and intimate settings to large spatial experiences in both urban and Forest settings.

Although the Forest is known by most for resort communities, amenities and developed recreation, there are also vast and remote backcountry areas and wildlands. The opportunity for solitude and personal challenge exists in dispersed use places that are accessed by many miles of back roads and challenging trails, including the Pacific Crest National Scenic Trail. The Forest is home to the Santa Rosa and San Jacinto Mountains National Monument near Palm Springs, co-managed with the Bureau of Land Management, which reaches from desert palm oases to snow-capped granite peaks. Abundant vistas from the roads and fire lookout towers to the valleys below and the adjacent mountains are awe-inspiring.

The San Bernardino has rich and varied biological and cultural resources within the wildland/urban interface and general forest. Major interpretive centers reach out to visitors with conservation education, where information is available to all about natural processes and conservation ethics to keep the Forest sustainable. Volunteers assist Forest visitors and help protect resources for the future generations. Urban outreach is a tool to enrich diverse visitors and inform the public of the natural process that will allow the Forest to thrive into the future.

Draft Niche Statement (for coming decade) "Families at play from urban edge to mountain vista"

Settings, Special Places, and Values, Activities/Opportunities/Experiences

The <u>Attraction</u> setting is the natural undeveloped lands surrounding alpine communities; a high elevation forest around major resort and housing accommodations. Large reservoirs and ski areas provide focal points for destination travel. The Attractions are Arrowhead, Big Bear and Idyllwild Place settings; these private land in holdings form the base attraction and the surrounding national forest provides the recreation opportunities. The character of the setting in geology and high elevation provides the basis for the development of the communities which complement the character of the setting.

The <u>Backdrop</u> setting is the highly visible interface between the urban boundaries and the geologic rise of the mountains within the national forest. This natural area is steep, but provides canyon areas for recreation close to communities as well as a viewshed that provides a unique character. Although its extreme slopes limit recreation to some people, the deeply incised frontage provides a variety of recreation opportunities close to urban areas. The primary value is the majestic mountain ranges which frames the Inland Empire, High Desert, Palm Springs and Los Angeles megalopolis and provide visual relief to the large populations traveling through and living there. The Places in this area are the Front Country, Front Country of San Bernardino, Desert Rim, Mojave Front Country, and Garner Valley.

<u>High Use</u> areas are in close proximity to the urban communities but provide a convenient setting for recreation to many people. The variety and quality of diverse recreation in undeveloped recreation area are the main qualities. Lytle Creek, the water body, is the main backbone of Lytle Creek Place. The creek is the setting for high intensive family water based usage while the steeply sloping sides of the surrounding canyon walls are the setting for forested wilderness. The native surface roads on the chaparral covered hillsides provide opportunities for natural resource activities and for exploring on rugged roads with licensed rough terrain capable vehicles.

<u>Wildlands</u> provide a variety of natural landscapes giving the base for many recreational activities as well as the habitat for a multitude of flora and fauna native to the area. In addition to personal challenge and soul restoration, the wildlands protect endangered and threatened species.

Primary Visitors: - See the 2004 San Bernardino National Forest NVUM Report for full details. Approximately 1,953,634 recreation visits in FY 2003; two-thirds male and one third female, 25% under the age of 16 and 23% between the ages of 30 to 39 (indicates family use), 70% white and 20% Latino.

Local – Generally visitors that live within one hour or less of the Forest; visits are often spontaneous and short-term. This constitutes much of the Forest recreation use.

Regional – Generally visitors that live within three hours from the Forest throughout southern California; visits are sometime spontaneous, but more often occur for a specific planned event or activity, including hiking, camping or auto touring, and are day-long and/or weekend. A Forest community is often the focus of the visit (e.g. Big Bear). A significant proportion of Forest visitors are of this type of use.

<u>National</u> – Generally visitors from beyond the southern California region; this type of use is relatively rare often occurring in conjunction with visits to other southern California attractions.

Development scales are defined by levels of site modifications, type of construction materials used, management controls, design style, development density, and services.

Deferred Maintenance. "Maintenance that was not performed when it should have been or when it was scheduled and which, therefore, was put off or delayed for a future period."

When allowed to accumulate without limits or consideration of useful life, deferred maintenance leads to deterioration of performance, increased costs to repair, and decrease in asset value.



Annual O&M Cost per visit and per PAOT day are averages derived from a summation of ALL the 91 analyzed recreation facilities on the Forest; the cost per visit and per PAOT for each site and site type will vary.

- PAOT An acronym for Persons-At-One-Time; a measure of facility or site <u>designed</u> recreation carrying capacity, particularly for developed sites. National conventions include 5 persons per family picnic/camp unit, 3.5 persons per parking lot stall at a trailhead or visitor center, 1.5 persons per motorcycle parking stall and 40 persons per tour bus parking stall.
- O&M Operations and maintenance; includes the activities and resources required to annually operate and maintain recreation sites at a level of quality which meets their management objectives and customer satisfaction. Costs associated with O&M are generally recurrent, as opposed to capital investment costs that are generally one-time and non-recurrent.
